The students continue to do well and develop their independence skills. All our students are now able to go offsite around the village independently and have all enjoyed the odd trip to the pub for some light refreshment, even inviting staff members to join them even though they didn't need to! All students are also now using the train line on a regular basis and continue to develop their skills with this – using it to go and socialise with friends or to commute to/from college and home. It is very handy indeed that the train station is right on our doorstep!

There is always an anxious feel in the Autumn Term as many are navigating new courses and qualifications in a different environment with a view to this being what will set them up for life, employment and general independence. For others, it is about resetting their goals for the next phase (s) of their education including the possibility of re-sits or completing the second year of their GCSE studies. We have a blended post-16 group this year and this has led to a varied approach to education across the board.

We have had a successful college cohort this term with 3 students working towards the qualifications they set out to achieve at the start of the academic year. These will be qualifications in disciplines such as Level 3 Art & Design, A-Level Fine Art, A-Level Animation, Psychology and a Digital T-Level in ICT. Students have worked exceptionally hard when at college and have been able to navigate a different and often new environment this year and to that end should be congratulated. On the Grateley school site this year, Post-16 students working towards qualifications in English, Maths, Geography, History, Science and Occupational Studies.

Additionally, the students are not only working towards formal qualifications but are also gaining the skills that will serve them well in the workplace or at a further education establishment in the future. This has been embodied with multiple work experience placements being undertaken with the school maintenance, kitchen and PE teams. Students have assisted within these sessions as part of their working week and are learning invaluable work skills in the process. We also have a student who is gaining work experience externally at the Watercress Line in the Engineering and Maintenance department. Ha has become one of the team there and was recently given a pass to travel on the Watercress Line whenever he wants, such is the impact that he has made in a relatively short time. We are very proud of this achievement.

We wish all the post-16 learners a restful winter break and hope that they can all return with motivation and strength to carry on in their learning journey next term.

## Subject News - Maths

Since September, we have welcomed in a new cohort of Year 7s. These guys have just begun to explore the world of algebra, and dare we say, they are enjoying it.

The Year 8s have been focusing on multiplicative change, including ratios and scale maps.

Year 9 have investigated conversions. This includes weight, capacity and length. Providing them with the opportunity to recap and strengthen their knowledge of multiplication and ratios.

Some of our Year 10s have done a deep dive into the world of Pythagoras and Trigonometry. They've been working so hard with all tasks, including changing the subject when working with the Sine, Cosine and Tangent Ratio.

Our Year 11s are approaching the end of their graphs unit. This has included topics that include speed/time graphs, piece-wise graphs and reciprocal graphs.

Some students from KS4 and KS5 have discovered an alternate pathway to unlocking their full potential and have begun their NCFE Functional Skills journey, allowing them to work towards Level 1 or Level 2.

Everyone has worked so hard this half-term. They have challenged themselves, even at times when they thought they couldn't do it. But they really made it look as easy as  $\pi$ .

## Bath Photography Trip



A HUGE thank you to Nick and Claire from some VERY satisfied customers!










#### Trussell Trust Food Bank
